Envisioning a Sustainable Future with Read around Sedona

It's our fourth Read Around Sedona initiative, and we're excited to feature *Dragonfly's Question* by local sustainability leader, volunteer, and author Darcy Hitchcock.

The Library's community-read initiative brings people together to read and discuss one book. Hitchcock's novella is a perfect choice for this goal and for Earth Month, as *Dragon-fly's Question* is designed for discussions on sustainability.

The novella tells the story of a father and daughter who have opposing views on sustainable living (see book review). A discussion guide follows the narrative, and considering Hitchcock's lifelong work to build community through conversation, this makes sense.

Hitchcock said she would love to discuss which ideas in the book spark the imagination of others and what improvements we all might consider for our own community.

The author of 10 nonfiction books on sustainability, Hitchcock enjoyed writing *Dragonfly's Question*, her first work of fiction. "The muse hijacked me to write this novella," she said. "It was so much fun. It just flowed, as if the book wrote itself!"

Hitchcock is co-founder of Sedona's Sustainability Alliance and the International Society of Sustainability Professionals. Among her other community endeavors, twice a week she cares for Sage, a blind mini-horse rescued by Double H Equine Foundation and Sanctuary.

Hitchcock reads from her book on Tuesday, April 28, at 10:30 a.m. in the community room at the Library, and the discussion that follows promises to be informative and heartfelt, focusing on the story, the issues, and how literature can be pivotal in community change.

Check out a copy of *Dragonfly's Question* now so you're ready for the discussion. A book signing will follow the reading, and the book will be available for purchase.

Read Around Sedona also includes an Earth Day trifecta from the Master Gardeners of University of Arizona Cooperative Extension in Yavapai County. Presentations include "Controlling Invasive Weeds in the Verde Valley Area," "Native Flora and Fauna of Verde Valley," and "The Beauty of English Gardens." Master Gardeners will have a table in the Library where they will be available to answer questions and provide reference materials. See Mark Your Calendar on page 7 for details.

DRAGONFLY'S QUESTION: A BALANCED AND PROVOCATIVE NOVELLA

Sustainability is a term that we often hear, yet I've never been quite sure what it means. Yes, in our household we are conscientious recyclers, but what else should we be doing? Darcy Hitchcock's novella, *Dragonfly's Question*, clarifies what is needed for us to create a sustainable environment.

Happily, the book is not preachy, and the conflict between sustainability advocate Tess, who lives in a progressive community in Portland, and her skeptical investment-banker father, allows both characters to present their viewpoints. Tess discusses ways to capture water and how to create a vehicle-sharing program; equally importantly, she emphasizes the need for creating community.

At the end of the book, her father may not be totally converted, but he understands the appeal of Tess's lifestyle and why it is better for the planet than his own. Some of the ideas presented might be challenging to implement in Sedona, but all are thought-provoking and worthy of discussion.

LET'S VISIT YOUTH SERVICES



We display nearly 21,000 books and media items ready for children of all ages and parents to browse and borrow—up to 50 items on your free library card at one time.

POETRY & PROSE PROJECT AT THE LIBRARY

Sedona Public Library is pleased to partner with Gary Every and Poetry & Prose, formerly known as Pumphouse Poetry & Prose. Welcome lovers of poetry, writing, and music to this "new" program!

Previously held at Sedona's historic Pumphouse, Poetry & Prose events now take place at the Library on the last Friday of the month. Poetry & Prose shows are well-loved gatherings where people listen to local, regional, and statewide writers and musicians, share new ideas, visit old friends, and make new ones.

The April show is always a highlight of the year, and certainly one of the most energetic: a classic poetry revue where performers pick favorite

classic poems to read. We'll hear works from a variety of voices, including familiar poets like Emily Dickinson, Pablo Neruda, Anne Sexton, or Walt Whitman. There are always poets you haven't heard in a while, or maybe never heard, and they're chosen by the line-up of great performers. Join us on Friday, April 24, at 5 p.m. in the community room for this *classic* event.

The Library's "Our Earth, Our Habitat, Our Home" speaker series continues this spring with poet Sherwin Bitsui on April 8 and essayist Nicole Walker on May 13. We are happy to conclude this yearlong program with two fabulous voices from Flagstaff.

Steeped in Native American culture, mythology, and history, Sherwin Bitsui's poems reveal the

tensions in the intersection of

Native American and contemporary

urban culture. As an eco-poet, Bitsui creates poems that are imagistic, surreal, and rich with details of the land-scape of the Southwest. His visit is the perfect event for April, when we celebrate Earth Month and Poetry Month.

Bitsui is the author of three collections: *Dissolve, Flood Song,* and *Shapeshift*. Originally from White Cone, Arizona, on the Navajo Reservation, Sherwin Bitsui is Diné of the Todích'ii'nii (Bitter Water Clan), born for the Tlizílaaní (Many Goats Clan).



Please join us for an evening with this talented and compelling Arizona poet who will read and discuss his work and sign books on April 8 at 6:30 p.m. in the community room.

Our final speaker, Nicole Walker, is looking forward to coming down the mountain from Flagstaff to share some of her most recent writing. In her work, Walker brings up a myriad of concerns, from global climate change to local

issues. She believes Sedona provides an audience ready to listen to the questions and answers she poses in her work, and we couldn't agree more.

Walker explains, "In these times of divisiveness, talking about how climate change affects us personally seems to bridge divides. Sedonans are deeply connected to people and place—they're already on the bridge with me."

Walker is the author of Sustainability:
A Love Story, The After-Normal, and many other works. She is a recipient of a National Endowment for the Arts fellowship, was named a notable essayist in The Best American Essays in 2008, 2014, 2015, and 2016, and was

a nonfiction winner of Best of the Net in 2013 and 2014. She is an Associate Professor at Northern Arizona University.


